A Note from the President

April Program

Phenology is a term that is very near and dear to me as it applies to the natural world. For those who don't know, phenology is the study of the times of recurring natural phenomena. Records of the dates that events like the spring migration (or spring for that matter), are of great use for those who study phenology. Examining the records can tell us when the best time to make a trip down the Mississippi to view the tundra swans or see bald eagles.

Swallows returning to the Mission at San Juan Capistrano is a classic example of a recurring event (March 19 is the expected date so you don't need to look it up.) Most recurring events happen within a range of dates, not just one specific date.

Reports of bird sightings posted to MOU and other sources are a type of phenological record. Over time, we have learned that around April 10 is the best time for viewing sandhill cranes along the Platte River in Nebraska. We have learned that the peak migration of turkey vultures past Hawk Ridge in Duluth is between September 15 and October 5, with the earliest record being August 2 and the latest November 26.

Pasque flowers are a sign of spring in much of the prairie region. They are often seen poking through the snow in early April. Pasque flowers are also the state flower of South Dakota, but that is not phenology, just trivia (although North Dakotans might differ).

Dragonflies, such as the Green Darner, start to reappear in late April. These insects are thought to be returning migrants. We often plan our events around phenology. Fall hawk watches and visits to Salt Lake are examples of trips timed for best viewing. Visits to Nerstrand Big Woods State Park are often planned around best viewing times for Spring Ephemerals. These are native plants that bloom in woodlands before the leaves provide too much shade. Pamela and I lead dragonfly walks in June for the most abundant times for many species.

We also have more human phenology. We often hear about the snow storms that accompany the high school sports tournaments.

And last but not least, it's that time again when we are looking for board of director candidates for the Audubon Chapter of Minneapolis. Watch for our recruiters or talk with a current board member for more information.

Art Brings Birds to People and People to Birds

April's featured speaker is artist and educator Cynde Randall, founder and artistic director of the Twin Cities non-profit known as "Bird x Bird." From 1984 to 2006, Randall served as Program Associate for the Minnesota Artists Exhibition Program, an artist-managed branch of The Minneapolis Institute of Arts (MIA). During her tenure at the MIA she helped to produce and present more than 100 exhibitions of contemporary art. Through words and photos, she will describe how art serves her passion for reconnecting people of all ages to nature and can help all of us develop compassion and empathy for the entire community of life with whom we share the Earth.

Bird x Bird's mission is to stimulate creative links between artists, scientists and the public, in an effort to enhance the stewardship of wild species and ecological literacy.

Since 2002, Bird x Bird has enlisted painters, printmakers, photographers, sculptors, and multi-media artists to create works of art in response to data collected about birds. It presents works that are decidedly contemporary, ranging widely in style, media, and content. Each year the artworks created are exhibited and auctioned, raising funds to benefit organizations that advocate for the environment. Over the past five years, the organization has grown from ten to 150 participants, including artists from Minnesota, Wisconsin, California, Illinois, Oregon, Washington, New York, Arizona, Montana, Missouri, and the UK.

Since 2004, Bird x Bird has worked in partnership with Eloise Butler Wildflower Garden & Bird Sanctuary at Theodore Wirth Park in Minneapolis and Audubon Center of the North Woods, a K-12 environmental learning center in Sandstone Minnesota. Both organizations collect and share data about avian species with Bird x Bird, which is posted on its website. The website (see www.birdxbird.org) has grown into a source of education and inspiration for artists around the planet. In turn, proceeds from the sale of artworks help support the work of both Eloise Butler and the Audubon Center



Beginning Birding Classes

Audubon Chapter of Minneapolis will be offering a two session Beginning Birding Class this Spring at the <u>Westwood Hills Nature Center</u>. Parents, bring your children! This is a lifelong activity that you can enjoy with them. The class is a comprehensive guide for people who are interested in learning how to identify birds. The class will provide a basic knowledge of birds. It will also provide the students with a method for observing a bird and help them identify it with the aid of a field guide.

Basic instructions on the use of binoculars and field guides will be included. At the end of the class, it will be expected that the student will be able to identify 10 easily recognized birds. They will also be well on their way with a little study to be able to identify 25 common Minnesota birds. Finally they will have the tools and knowledge on how to identify many of the migratory birds that pass through the area. The class will include a field trip on Saturday to apply what has been learned in the classroom. Students are asked to bring a field guide and their binoculars to both sessions. A limited number of binoculars and field guides will be supplied. Prepare for the weather because the field trip will be held rain or shine!

Anyone over the age of eight is encouraged to sign up for the class. The fee for this class is \$5.00. One child between the ages 8 and 18 attending with a registered adult is free. Happy Birthday to John James Audubon

April 26

The National Audubon Society, founded in 1905, is one of the oldest and largest conservation organizations in North America, but John James Audubon was never a member of the society. One of the most romantic figures of the nineteenth century, Audubon was an artist, naturalist, explorer, writer, publisher, and environmentalist.

His monumental publication, *The Birds of North America*, with over 400 stunning watercolors, captures the rich diversity of the natural world through its depictions of birds from southern Florida to Labrador, from New York to the wilds of Kentucky, Pennsylvania, and Louisiana.

Many credit Audubon's art with providing the spark for America's passion for bird-watching and for protecting wild life in general. Audubon's wife, Lucy, used her husband's paintings as teaching aids, which deeply impressed one of her students, George Bird Grinnell. When Grinnell formed a new bird protection organization, he named it for the artist, guaranteeing that Audubon's name and legacy would continues long after his death.
