
Last week's rain gave the preschool a great opportunity to set up an Lin-room obstacle course. It included a tunnel, "stepping stones", balance boards, hopping pads, and a ramp to climb and jump from. The activity was accompanied by the great Latino tunes at 104.5 FM, the perfect music to get us moving and to support our Spanish program!

Winnie Doyle, mother of Frank (FSH '07) and a graduate student in education at Cabrini College, has been spending three mornings a week in the preschool classroom providing guidance and learning from the children. Her cheerful, supportive, and unflappable presence as well as her respect for young children have been wonderful gifts to the preschool program. We are grateful to "Mrs. Doyle" for giving us her time and talents including her photographic skills. We are lucky to have her with us.



Spanish classes began last week when Profesora Adriana came to the classroom. She read to the Children the Story of Goldilocks and the Three Bears in Spanish. New vocabulary included: ola, adios, uno, dos, tres, and oso. During the class, it became obvious that today's children have a great deal of exposure to the Spanish language before entering school.

In addition to the homemade applesause, our snack times have included a variety of nutritious foods such as cheese and crackers, grapes, apples, celery and carrots served with ranch dressing, and kettle popped popcorn made right in the classroom. You might have seen pictures of children raising their hands with one or five fingers. This is preschool code for more snack or more water. It works really well at school and might explain the raised hands at your table at home.

he children had a personal encounter with a caterpillar of a polyphemus moth (see picture on right) last Friday. The already sizable



caterpillar, found in Tr. Jennifer's backyard, looked huge under the magnification of the Preschool CCTV (a gift of the friends and family of the class of 2014). There was discussion of safe handling of backyard critters and the need to return all faunae to their natural habitat.

NOTE: The preschool teachers hope that families will share their treasures of nature – alive and otherwise – with the class. Please let the teachers know ahead of time what is being sent in so that a little research may be done

before the critter's arrival. This is also true for interesting florae. With the CCTV, what looks ordinary with the naked eye, becomes extraordinary when magnified hundreds of times.

The children have been hearing lots of Spanish in preschool. Profesora Adriana made her first visit to the classroom and introduced new vocabulary through the Spanish version of *The Three Bears* - *Los Tres Osos*. Ola, adios, uno, dos, tres, and oso will be used during the week to reinforce vocabulary acquisition. At the snack table, children can say thank you in Spanish - *gracias* - and teachers respond "*de nadd*".

Music permeates much of the preschool day. Music marks transistions during the day and is often sung spontaneously during free play. Much of the music sung at circle time and during the twice weekly classes with Teacher Joanna can be located on the preschool webpage. Be sure that your speakers are turned on. Each week the preschool class spends time in the gym. Under Jen and Tina's supervision, the children play with a range of equipment including: balls, scarves, seated scooters, hoops, and percussion instruments. This gross motor play is accompanied by a wide range of original world music including the Beatles, Native American ceremonial music, Scottish highland pipes and drums, the music of the calliope and music box, Sousa marches ,and music from the Carribean and Africa. Last week young Noah, a Beatles fan who recognized the voice of Ringo singing "The Yellow Submarine", asked, "Is that the White Album?"

Bee! Bee! Bumble bee! Stung a man upon his knee, Stung a pig upon his snout, I declare that you are out!

This is the time of year when yellow jackets seem to be everywhere. Preschoolers are learning that these hungry critters are very nearsighted and need to get a close up look to identify flowers in their environment. The children stand very still, waiting patiently for Miss Bee to see that the only flowers in our room were on a pair of shorts!





In the morning, preschool "scouts" venture out to see if the slides are wet or dry. When the the slides are covered with dew or rain, preschoolers get to work with their squeegee and chamois cloth to dry the slides for the day. Sometimes adventurous children slide down the boards and dry the wet slides on their bottoms! We call the resulting damp clothes "puddle pants". Both methods are fun and quite effective in drying the slides - a sort of preschool service project!



Moments for scientific discovery happen everyday in preschool. On two recent occasions, the children have spotted elaborate spider webs constructed on the play equipment at the rear of our building. Once discovered, great lengths are taken to preserve the spider's habitate and to observe the spider as she waits for her prey. The children have been incredibly respectful of these discoveries.

The children enthusiastically ate the freshly popped kernels of corn on Monday. They watched as the oil and kernels covered the bottom of the pot, and waited for the smells and sounds of the popping corn. The children performed a dramatic reenactment of a kernel of corn sitting in a pot waiting for just the right moment. The poem was created years ago by young Jamie, a former preschooler, now in college.
