


sweet gum ball



Gems of nature:





A seed and a leaf from a sweet gum tree. We discovered that one seed pod can contain up to 50 seeds and that as the "gum ball" dries it releases vast amounts of tiny particles. Bring one into your house and be amazed by the drying process!

Preschool Integrated Curriculum:

Visual discrimination visual arts, botany, language arts and (receptive and expressive), small motor

Children made the visual distinction between sugar maple and white oak leaves.

The children felt for the veined side of the oak leaf and dabbed the bumpy side with autumn colors - red, yellow, and orange.

When the leaf was lifted it created a silhouette; when the painted side was placed on a new surface, it created an image of itself, veins and all.

HALLOWEEN REMINDERS FOR PARENTS OF PRESCHOOLERS

If your child wishes to wear a costume in the School Halloween Parade (Tuesday, October 31) we ask that you be guided by the following:

- Between 8:00am and 8:15am all children come to the classroom with a safety as usual. Parents may park and begin to gather for the parade
- Children will arrive dressed for the parade if participating.
- 8:30am parents will assemble in the driveway or the gym, depending on weather.
- Teachers will take plenty of pictures during the morning. **We ask family members not to drop into the classroom either before or after the parade.** These drop-ins can be upsetting to the children whose parents have remained upstairs. Mrs. Doyle and Cy will join Tina and Jen in the classroom to help prepare the children for the parade and to help with the transition to a normal day at the parade's conclusion.
- **Keep it simple.** At the last moment your child may choose not to wear a costume or participate in the parade; will respect the child's wishes.
- **Masks are not safe for young children and will not be worn at the parade.** Negotiating stairs and sitting for long periods are not compatible with wearing a mask. Consider face painting as a safe and comfortable alternative.
- **Dangerous weapons or props may not come to school.**
- Preschool will sit together as a class. Parents and family members will stand in assigned areas along the driveway. If it is wet, we will sit as a class in the gym and parents are asked to stay on the perimeter of the room.
- **Younger siblings stay with parents.** Please do not send younger siblings to sit with the class. The preschool teachers will have their hands full already!
- **Parents will leave directly from the parade.** Children will return to classrooms to resume a normal school day. Teachers will pack costumes in the children's backpacks. Make sure that all parts of the costume are clearly labeled with the child's name.
- **DO send warm play clothes and jacket for your child to change into.**

Thank you for keeping it simple, safe, and as stress-free as possible.
