Integrated Curriculum: Physical (fine motor), Art (color mixing), Math (greater than/less than)



Eye droppers are a challenging way to transfer liquid from one container to another. The turkey basters are so much easier! Here, Emily and Madison work with water and food coloring to create new colors. If you look closely at their hands you can see that they are using their fore finger and thumb. This skill will transfer easily to the pincer grasp which is used when working with crayons, pencils, and markers for drawing and writing.

Integrated Curriculum (Child inspired, Teacher as facilitator): Imaginative and cooperative play, committee work, fine motor

Here's a good example of the kind of activity that will allow preschoolers to create their own play with little or no teacher direction. Sebastian decided he wanted to play 'robot'. Without missing a beat, the teacher responded by quickly putting together some top notch robot hats. Lots of friends took Sebastian's lead and got in on the





imaginative play. Others were interested in the hat making process and decorated the hats with stickers.

Within this activity children had opportunities to make decisions about their play, extend their ideas, play along side and together with classmates, get crafty, and use their developing fine motor skills. Interest was high and there were smiles all around. The FSH preschool classroom provides kids with the precious time and the safety of a familiar space to engage their imaginations while teachers follow the lead of the child.



Self-Help Skills

In our family we believe we should give babies/ kids/ teenagers "What they need until they don't need it anymore." The trick is reading the cues and following your heart to discern when that time has come. Often children are ready to do new things before parents even realize a change has occurred. Talking to others and knowing developmental milestones can help us know when to step out of the familiar routine we've developed with our little ones and allow them to take the next step toward independence.

In the classroom you see children dressing themselves to go out in the cold and snow. Preschool teachers set the scene by laying clothes on the floor in a logical sequence: snow pants, boots, jacket, hat and mittens. Teachers are nearby to offer a friendly face, words of encouragement, and sometimes a song as kids practice this important self-help skill. As you would expect, frustration sometimes happens for children in the classroom and on the playground. Children do struggle with a boot, mitten, or tangled strap once in a while. But success also happens, and that is the goal. Sometimes, as parents and teachers, we often jump in to put a hat or a shoe on for a child, or to wipe a runny nose when we see the frustration level rising. Let's face it, after so many years of practice ourselves, we can be quick and efficient at these tasks. And getting out the door on time often guides our decisions in helping our little ones with things like these. However, as I've been reminded these past five months, kids can do things themselves and, when we give them the time to practice, they can master these skills. When this happens we have done our job as advocates for our young learners as they grow toward independence and competence!

Back in the fall a visiting teacher told the FSH faculty that the way to empower our students as learners and problem solvers is to avoid the "swoop and rescue." Instead of jumping in and doing a challenging task for a child, acknowledge that the task might be difficult and that you see the child is working hard toward mastering it.
