15 Churchmen Sent to Prison

Fifteen Protestant churchmen were sentenced by Communist Bulgaria yesterday on charges of spying and black marketing. Four were sentenced to life imprisonment and nine received sentences ranging from 5 to 15 years. Two who received one-year sentences went free on parole. Story on Page 7.

In addition, the 15 defendants In addition, the 10 utermanner were deprived of civil rights for a varying terms, deprived of some or 7 all property, fined an over-all total for about 10 million leva (\$30,000) and ordered to pay court costs. 1

Defendants and the prosecution announced their acceptance of the sentences, so there will be no appeal.

The government is now expected to start prosecution of up to 50 more of the total of 138 Protestant pastors in Bulgaria.

Those sentenced today were:

Life imprisonment—Vassil Geor-giev Zyapkov, 48, Congregation-alist, ranking Protestant pastor in Bulgaria and representative of the United Evangelical Churches for Bulgaria; Yanko Nicolov Ivanov, 48, supreme supervisor of the Methodist Church; Nicola Mihailov Naumov, 49, secretary of the Baptist Church Union board, and Georgi Nicolov Chernev, 46, chief of the Pentecostal Church.

Fifteen years-Lambri Marinov 41, Mishkov. Congregationalist; Georgi Nicolov, Vassev, 48, Baptist; Haralan Ivanov Popov, 41, Pentecostal, and Zdravko Ivanov Bezlov, 28, Methodist.

Ten years-Yoncho Nicolov Dryanov, 41, Pentecostal; Ivan Ange-' lov Stankulov, 44, Baptist, and Zahari Spassov Raychef, 50, Baptist.

Six years and eight months-Mitko Mateev Dimitrov, 39, Church of Christ.

-Ladin Ivanov Popov, **Five years-**36, Pentecostal. He denied the charge of espionage and was not convicted on it.

The 13 men facing prison terms were taken back at once to the high-walled central prison to start serving their terms.

Each defendant was assessed 1.\$255 for court costs.
