Bulgaria Rests Case Against 15 Pastors

The government tonight suddenly
halted its parade of 60-odd witnesses against 15 Protestant pastors accused of espionage and treason and concluded its case against
them. A verdict is expected Mon-

The prosecution dropped 42 witnesses who were scheduled to appear in court, indicating their testimony would have been re-

dundant.

Fourteen of the 15 churchmen pleaded guilty to the charges of espionage, treason and black market activities. Ladin Ivanov Bopov, small town pentecostal preacher, confessed only to black marketing mrwyp Bt the men anup anmawo

The court will recess Thursday in honor of Bulgaria's independence day. Friday and Saturday attorneys for both sides will sum up. The sentences probably will come on Monday.

Witnesses today told how the defendants had solicited military data and other information from them. There was no way to distinguish between witnesses for the prosecution and witnesses for the defense. The testimony of all was qually damasing.

For the first time in the five-day trial documelts were introduced in court. Both the prosecution and defense submitted letters and arti-

cles to support their cases.

Yanko Nicolov Ivanov, supreme supervisor of the Methodist church, heard his son testify against him today. Young Yanko said his father whose name he bears had asked him for information on plane production. The junior Ivanov formerly was a pilot in the Bulgarian air force.
