

Religious Liberty, Adventists' Topic

The eight Seventh Day Adventist Churches of Washington and Takoma Park will join denominational churches throughout the United States today in celebration of their national religious liberty day.

A program suggested by the religious liberty department of the world's general conference of the organization, with headquarters in Washington, will be used as basis for the day's service. Two of the readings that will be given are entitled "Living in Ominous Times," by the Rev. Heber H. Votaw, and "The Sword Versus the Cross," by the Rev. C. S. Longacre.

Members of the Seventh Day Adventist Church will be urged today to work for the principles of freedom, and to warn their friends and neighbors that "eternal vigilance is the price of liberty."

Mr. Longacre will speak in the Takoma Park Church at 10:45 a. m. Services in all the churches will begin at that hour.
