Editorial

Bystanders' apathy.....

There are about eleven thousand members in All India Ophthalmological Society at present and out of them more than Six thousand participated in AIOC – 2009 at Jaipur. However, the General Body Meeting on the afternoon of 7th February, 2009 had to be adjourned due to lack of quorum and restarted after half an hour as per constitution with a sparse attendance of more or less one hundred members. All the vital decisions of the society had to be finalized in that adjourned meeting. The situation repeats every year and at every venue. To verify, one can go through the minutes of all the GB Meetings in the past.

In the Vice President election, approximately around one thousand votes were polled at Jaipur whereas the member registration was morre than six thousand. Our present President, Dr. Babu Rajendran, who had already thought over the issue, had a trial of an experimental e-voting system to overcome the problem. He communicated to seven hundrred members and out of them only seventy nine people rresponded for the trial.

The same scenario prevails in most of the state society affairs also. It reflects an apathetic mental projection of the common members in participating in the important decision / policy making processes of the society. The said apathy puts a serious question mark on the upliftment and maintenance of a society. The larger the society, the more glaring is the problem. The security and protection of the society get endangered in such situations and it becomes very vulnerable in maintaining its stability.

Members should strive to exert their power and rights for the benefit and well being of the society. The basic understanding that must never be forgotten is that the office bearers are only the representatives of the members of the society and they only execute the decisions of the majority of members. The situation can improve only by participation of the common members in greater numbers.

This issue invites a serious attention. The office bearers should try to communicate and incorporate the members in the decision making process by decentralizing the jobs. Ways should be worked out on the 'feel important' factor for the members. However, the key to the problem exists in the hands of the common members and only their active participation is probably the best and easiest solution.

Ophthalmologist archives songs of Rabindranath Tagore. An achievement unparalleled !

Dr. Purnendu Bikash Sarkar has created "Gitabitan Archive" where all the 2212 songs of Kabiguru, written in his lifetime have been compiled with an entertaining retrieval system. Born on 16th October 1955, Dr. Sarkar completed his schooling from Gobardanga of North 24 Parghanas and MBBS from Calcutta Medical College in 1980. After completion of his post graduate diploma in Ophthalmology in 1984, Dr.Sarkar started his practice at Salt Lake Eye Foundation, Kolkata.

Gitabitan Archive is a DVD based software which can be played easily on a computer. Clicking the "Icon"- a colorful window opens up where 2212 songs of Gitabitan have been arranged alphabetically. On clicking any of these songs, appears a list of artists who have sung the particular



song. Clicking the name of any artist from the list, the song starts playing and the picture of the artist is displayed in a frame. In the foot-note all possible information about the song, like category, sub-category, serial number, date of creation, age at which written, number in Swarabitan, detail of Sur/Tal & Raga and many more interesting details are available.

The Lyric, Notation, Time of first recording and all other necessary information of the song are available by clicking respective buttons. Several kinds of incorporated search options help locating a song of choice simple and easy.

It contains all the information & complete lyric of 4 'Nrityanatya', 3 'Geetinatya', 86 songs of Gitanjali and 433 Brahma Sangeet in this Archive. 242 'Bhanga gan' have been listed in this Archive, where the original song can be compared with the respective Rabindrasangeet. The DVD is a treasure house of 9 songs & 17 recitations in Tagore's own voice.



The untiring job of research and compilation has been done by Dr. Sarkar and the DVD is commercially published by "SAREGAMA HMV". Gitabitan Archive was officially inaugurated by Smt. Suchitra Mitra & Dwijen Mukhopadhyay on 5th May 2006 at Bangla Academy. It has also been demonstrated at Detroit Banga Sanmelan (USA), and many other places . On 15th Oct 2008, Dr. Sarkar was felicitated at Rabindra Sadan for his Gitabitan Archive by "Mohordhara". Gitabitan Archive has been collected by more than 5000 people in India & abroad. Now it has become a 'Collector's Item'.

Here is an interview with Dr. Sarkar, exclusive for "Ophthabuzz" only.

How did you conceive the idea?

I use computer in every sphere of my life since 1995. And like every Bengali, I love Rabindrasangeet from the core of my heart. From 2002, I started collecting Rabindrasangeet and stored them in my laptop. Simultaneously I was going through the research about every song written by Tagore. I wanted to preserve the songs in such a media that everybody can enjoy any song of his choice.

What were the early inception events?

I started the project as a personal hobby only. Gradually it turned the way to a creative work. I collected the data in my laptop; collected the songs both common and rare ones, edited them through different softwares, and started developing the Gitabitan Archive software.

What is the actual purpose?

- 1. To listen to any Rabindrasangeet, immediately just with a mouse click.
- 2. To get detailed information about every song.
- 3. To augment interest about Rabindrasangeet in the younger generation (through a media that is compatible with the time and generation).
- 4. Preservation of entire Gitabitan & Rabindra Sangeet.

Your message to the readers of Ophthabuzz?

"Karmanyay wadhikarastay maa phalesu kadachanah". I started it as my hobby and continued only being in love with the job. I am grateful to the people that my humble effort becomes useful to them.

We have lost two of our members in the recent past

Prof. Muralidhar Sengupta. OSWB Membership No: S – 427 Born on: 12th December 1911

Expired on: 28th November 2008

The most influential personality of Ophthalmology in West Bengal bellowed his first cry in a doctor's family... that of Dr. Jogesh Ch. Sengupta, in the shivering cold winter of Munger in Bihar. His father was

in the transferable job of Bengal Medical Service. Hence he had his schooling at severral places and finally received his School Leaving Certificate at Khulna. He completed his I. Sc. at Rajsahi.

An extraordinary brilliant student with a family background of medical profession, he joined Calcutta Medical College to serve the suffering humanity. He completed his MBBS in 1937 and got wedded to Dr. Aruna Sen who was also his classmate and a good friend. As a studious fellow he earned the Government College Scholarship, Gold Medal in Surgery, Duke of Edinburgh prize in Surgery and Honours in Pathology. He passed DOMS (London) in 1949 and became the fellow of the National Academy of Medical Sciences in 1963.

He worked in the General Surgery Department of Calcutta

Medical College from 1937 to 1941. His blooming career in Ophthalmology started after this initial spell when he was spotted by General Kirwan and he joined the Eye Department of Calcutta Medical College on his instruction. He joined as House Surgeon, matured himself through the responsibilities of Registrar, Resident Surgeon and Assistant Professor and gracefully retired as a guiding personality in the field of Ophthalmology in West Bengal as the Professor and the head of the Institute of Ophthalmology in 1971. As an exceptional teacher he was taken back to the Calcutta Medical College even after his retirement as Emeritus Professor of Ophthalmology. For a short spell he was transferred to N R S Medical College and his midas touch and planning saw the birth of the Department of Ophthalmology there.

Having a tremendous foresight on the legal aspects, he was instrumental in having the Cornea Grafting act passed and then established the first eye bank in West Bengal. He masterminded the planning of the "School of Optometry" and the "Retina Clinic" in the "Eye Infirmary" building which later became the "Regional Institute of Ophthalmology". Under the guidance of Capt. Kiran Sen he devoted himself to retinal surgery and started the Retina Research Clinic at Medical College.

Honours and responsibilities kept this popular personality busy throughout his life. The following are only a few to mention...

- 1. Hony. Secretary and President of OSWB.
- 2. Chairman of the editorial board of Bengal Ophthalmic Journal of OSWB.
- 3. President of AIOS.
- 4. Hony. Secretary and President of the Association for the Prevention of Blindness.
- 5. Fellow of State Medical Faculty of West Bengal.
- 6. Vice President of Light House for the Blind.
- 7. President of Eye Care and Research Centre.
- 8. President of Eye Donation Society.

His wife Dr. (Mrs.) Aruna Sengupta who was the Deputy Director in heath services, expired in 1993. He is survived by his able son Dr. Dipankar Sengupta, well known surgeon in Gastroenterology and daughter in law, the reputed Ophthalmologist of Kolkata Dr. (Mrs.) Juthika Pal. Last but not the least the 4th generation doctor in the family is his grandson Dr. Raja Sengupta who has just completed his MBBS from Calcutta National Medical College.

May his soul rest in peace.

Dr. Balai Krishna Mitra. OSWB Membership No: M - 259 Born on: 5th July 1921

Expired on: 31St December 2008

"Dikay dikay sei baarta rati galo kromay". Thanks to the SMS alert facility that hass been introduced by the new Executive Committee of OSWB, the newss of the sad demise of the father figure of the ophthalmic fraternity of West Bengal spread like wildfire on the morning of the last day of the year. His affectionate student, Dr. Amarnath De walked down the memory lane to pen the following lines.....

The bestowed son of undivided India, Sri Balai Krishna was born in the district of Khulna as the second son of Sri Amritalal and Smt. Binapani Mitra. 'Binapani', being the mythological deity of education, aptly gifted a talented 'Baraputra' (bestowed

son) to the mother earth. He completed matriculation from his village school and I Sc. from Khulna Sadar College.

He entered Medical College, Bengal (presently Calcutta Medical College) in 1938 in the last batch of the 6 year course of MB. After the successful completion of the bachelor degree, he gained experience as Houseman in the departments of Surgery, Medicine and Ophthalmology. As an active member of the Students' Union, during this period, he led the movement of demand for stipend for the housemen and succeeded in a historical start.

Capt. Kiran Sen, the principal of Lake Medical College offered him to work there in 1947 and he accepted. Lake Medical College, situated on the banks of present Rabindra Sarobar was the usual structure of army-barrack along Southern Avenue. It was a glamorous teaching school for the army doctors of that time. Capt. Sen made him prudent under his affectionate guidance and encouraged to complete the DOMS course of two years at Calcutta Medical College. "Teaching is one of the best ways of learning" and Dr. Mitra sharpened his knowledge in Ophthalmology participating in the teaching programmes at the Lake Medical College.

After passing DOMS in 1952, he joined Calcutta Medical College as Hony. Junior Visiting Surgeon. Except for a short spell of 6 months when he was transferred to N R S Medical College, he spent a period of 30 years in Calcutta Medical College and was promoted from Hony. Junior Visiting Surgeon to Hony. Senior Visiting Surgeon and retired as Hony. Reader. He was a teacher as well as examiner for both the under graduate and post graduate courses in the University. As an established academician he has many publications and lectures in various conferences abroad.

Honours and responsibilities flowed into his charismatic persona and in 1977 he became the president of OSWB and that of AIOS in 1980. However the dedicated *Vaishnabite* man believed in devotion to work and faith in the divinnity of Lord *Srikrishna Chaitanya* and said *"Iha Bajhya"* (This is meaningless).


Well known for his punctuality in class as well as the academic sessions of conferences, he also had a popular image for his sense of wit. The life long bachelor did love his students as his sons and daughters so much that they started an award in OSWB during his lifetime.

Soul is immortal. So the immortal soul of this magnanimous personality will live in our hearts forever. Sir! You will remain here eternally and continue to love and bless us. We will miss you during the academic meets and conferences but we know very well that your blessings will continue to shower upon us the same way for ever. May your soul rest in eternal peace.

The Indian Alumni Group of ICEH (International Centre for Eye Health), London conducted their 9th Annual Meet at Hotel Countyy Inn at Jaipur on the 3rd and 4th February 2009. At their Extended Managing Committee Meeting on the evening of 3rd February, it was decided to dissolve the existing Alumni Group

and to form a new society titled "Indian Association of Community Ophthalmology" utilizing the existing member strength. The necessary constitution was formulated accordingly and the participation and membership was opened to all the ophthalmologists who work for community ophthalmology. The idea is to widen the participation keeping pace with same sort of associations in the neighboring countries like Pakistan Association of Community Ophthalmology (PACO) and Bangladesh Community



Ophthalmology Association (BCOA). The goal of the society will be advocacy of Community Eye Health services in the Indian subcontinent. Previously the association was only for the Alumni of the ICEH, London.

The two day programme was packed with many scientific presentations. Members from Bangladesh and Nepal and eminent personalities of Community Ophthalmology Service in India participated in the meeting. Dr. C. Balakrishna (Kadappa Medical College, Andhra Pradesh) was installed as the President and Dr. Pannalal Saha (Kolkata) as the President elect.
