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Setting Up .Mac

This chapter provides instructions for installing .Mac software and activating your membership.

Installing .Mac Software

Your .Mac CD includes Virex, Backup, iPhoto, iCal, and iSync.

To install your .Mac software:

- 1 Insert the .Mac CD into the drive.
- 2 Double-click the Internet Services Suite CD icon on your desktop.
- 3 Double-click the icon for the software you want to install:
 - To install Backup, iPhoto, iCal, and iSync, double-click the “Install and Activate dotMac” icon and follow the onscreen instructions.
 - To install Virex, double-click the “Virex 7.2.pkg” icon in the Virex folder and follow the onscreen instructions.

The latest versions of these applications are available on the web. Go to www.mac.com for any product updates or new .Mac features. If you need additional installation information, see “Read before you install” on your .Mac CD.

Activating Your .Mac Membership

In order to take full advantage of all the software and services available with .Mac, you will be asked to activate your membership while the .Mac applications are being installed. You can also use this activation process to upgrade a current trial or email-only account, or renew an existing .Mac membership.

If you choose not to activate your membership during installation, you can activate your account on the web at www.mac.com/activate.

To activate your .Mac membership:

- 1 Click the Activate Now button while the .Mac applications are being installed, or go to www.mac.com/activate at any time.
- 2 Type your activation key in the Activation Key field. (Your activation key is printed on the protective sleeve of the .Mac CD.)
- 3 Choose whether you want to use your activation key to create a new account, upgrade a current trial account, or renew an account.
- 4 Type the member name and password you want and click Continue.
- 5 Fill out the .Mac Sign Up form and click Continue.
Be sure to select the “Keep me updated” checkboxes to receive ongoing news about special membership benefits.
- 6 To have your .Mac membership renew automatically, enter your billing information, then click Continue. If you don’t want your membership to renew automatically, deselect the Auto-Renewal checkbox.
- 7 Print your account settings for future reference, and then click Continue.

Setting Up Your .Mac Preferences

Use Mac OS X to set your .Mac preferences to access your .Mac account, including your iDisk and your .Mac Mail account.

To set up your .Mac preferences:

- 1 Choose Apple () > System Preferences.
- 2 Do one of the following to access the .Mac preferences pane:
 - If you’re using Mac OS X version 10.3, click the .Mac icon.
 - If you’re using a version of Mac OS X earlier than version 10.3, click the Internet icon and then click the .Mac or iTools tab.
- 3 Enter your .Mac member name and password.

Setting Up Mac OS X Mail to Receive Your .Mac Mail Messages

Information about your membership and .Mac services will be sent to your .Mac Mail address, including information about your account and news about software updates and new features you can download.

To set up Mac OS X Mail to receive .Mac Mail messages:

- 1 Open Mail, then choose Mail > Preferences.
- 2 Click Accounts, and do one of the following to add an account:
 - If you're using Mac OS X version 10.3 or later, click the Add (+) button.
 - If you're using a version of Mac OS X earlier than version 10.3, click Add Account or Create Account.
- 3 Choose .Mac or Mac.com Account from the Account Type pop-up menu.
- 4 Type your .Mac member name in the User Name field.
- 5 Type your .Mac password in the Password field.

If you plan to use an email account other than your .Mac Mail account, you should have your .Mac Mail messages automatically forwarded to that account. For information on using .Mac Mail on the web and with email applications other than Mac OS X Mail, go to www.mac.com and click Help on the .Mac tab.

With .Mac, your important information is always at your fingertips and up to date. You can store files on Apple's servers and access them from any computer—Mac or Windows—on the Internet.

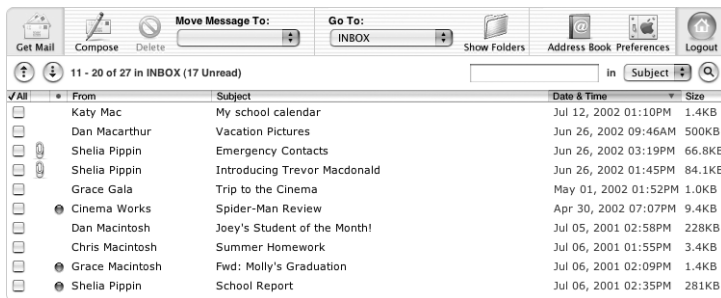

Sharing Your Files

This chapter highlights some commonly used features of .Mac and gives you simple steps for sharing your movies, photos, and files.

Working With .Mac Mail

Your .Mac Mail account includes 15 megabytes of storage space. You can use standard email programs like Outlook Express, Netscape Communicator, and Mac OS X Mail to access your .Mac Mail account. You can also check .Mac Mail when you're away from your own computer—all you need is a computer with an Internet connection and a supported web browser to read and send messages.



Sending a Message With .Mac Mail on the Web

When you use .Mac Mail on the web, it's easy to send mail from any Macintosh or Windows computer with an Internet connection and a supported web browser.

To send a message:

- 1 Go to www.mac.com and click Mail.
- 2 Click Compose.
- 3 Enter your recipient's email address and a subject.
- 4 Type your message.
- 5 Click Send.

It's also easy to address a message to someone in your .Mac Address Book. Go to www.mac.com, click Address Book, select the checkboxes to the left of the contacts you want to receive your message, and then click Compose.

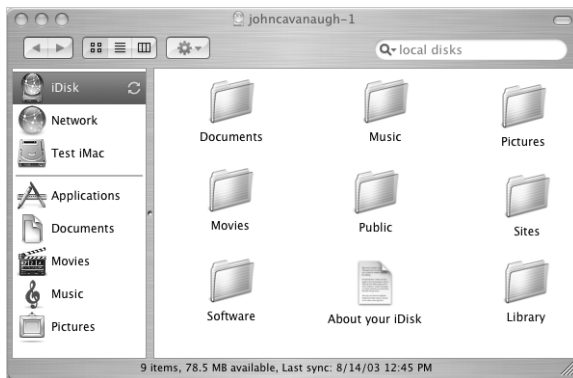
You can add additional email storage, automatically forward messages to other accounts, include a photo signature with your messages, send an automatic reply, and much more.

Using Your iDisk

iDisk is your personal storage space on the Internet. You can access it from any computer that's connected to the Internet. Use it to host a website, store or back up documents, or share your files with anyone who has an Internet connection.



Using iDisk to Share Files

You can use your iDisk to share files with anyone on the Internet, including Windows users.

To use iDisk to share files:

- 1 Choose Go > iDisk > My iDisk. (If you're using a version of Mac OS X earlier than 10.3, choose Go > iDisk.)
- 2 Copy files you want to share to the Public folder.
- 3 If you created a copy of your iDisk on your computer, be sure it's synchronized with your iDisk on .Mac. (For more information, see "Managing iDisk synchronization" in Mac Help.)
- 4 Give your .Mac member name to others so they can connect to your iDisk Public folder using either a Mac or Windows computer.
 - If you're sharing files with someone who uses Mac OS X version 10.3 or later, they choose Go > iDisk > Other User's Public Folder to access your files.
 - If you're sharing files with someone who uses Mac OS X version 10.2 or earlier, see the help topic, "Connecting to someone's Public folder using Mac OS X version 10.2 or earlier" in Mac Help.
 - If you're sharing files with someone who uses Windows, see the help topic, "Connecting to someone's Public folder using Windows" in Mac Help.

Learning More About iDisk

iDisk works with other .Mac services, such as iCards, HomePage, and Backup, making it easy for you to send custom electronic greeting cards, publish a website featuring your pictures and iMovies, and back up important files from your computer's hard disk. You can also connect to your iDisk from other computers, password-protect your Public folder, add storage to your iDisk, and much more.

Sharing With HomePage

Use HomePage to create and publish a single webpage, a complete website, or several different sites. Your sites are hosted on Apple's servers, so people can view them at any time. HomePage makes it easy to choose pages based on a variety of themes, add your own text, photos, and movies, then publish them to the web.



Publishing a Photo Album Using iPhoto

You can use iPhoto to publish a photo album on your HomePage website.

To publish a photo album on the web:

- 1 Open iPhoto.
- 2 Select individual images or an entire album.
- 3 Click the Organize button.
- 4 Click the HomePage icon in the Organize pane.
- 5 To edit your album, do one or more of the following:
 - To change the page design, click a different theme at the bottom of the HomePage window.
 - To change the order of your pictures, drag them to new locations in the window.
 - To choose a layout for your page, click 2 Columns or 3 Columns.
 - To edit the text, highlight the text you want to change and type new text.
 - If you want to display a visit counter that keeps track of how many times your page is viewed, select the Counter checkbox.
 - If you want to display a "Send me a message" button on your published page so that people visiting your website can send you an iCard with their feedback, select the "Send Me a Message" checkbox.
- 6 If you have more than one HomePage site, choose the site you want to add the photo album to.
- 7 Click Publish and note the address for your website.

To view the album on the web, click the View Page Now button in the confirmation dialog or use your web browser to visit your HomePage website.

Creating a File Sharing Page

You can create a webpage that lets others view or copy files in your iDisk Public folder.

To create a file sharing page:

- 1 Choose Go > iDisk > My iDisk. (If you're using a version of Mac OS X earlier than 10.3, choose Go > iDisk.)
- 2 Drag the files you want to share to the Public folder on your iDisk.
Note: To offer your files to the widest possible audience, use filenames that are compatible with computers that don't offer the same filename flexibility as your Macintosh. For more information, see "Naming files for sharing" in the HomePage section of .Mac Help.
- 3 Go to www.mac.com and click HomePage.
- 4 Click the File Sharing tab and choose a color.
- 5 To edit text, click the Edit button, highlight the text you want to change, and type new text.
- 6 Click Preview to see how your page will look on the web.
- 7 When you're done editing and previewing your file sharing page, click Publish.

In addition to publishing photo albums and file sharing pages on the web, you can use HomePage to share your iMovies, create invitations and newsletters, post your resume, and much more.

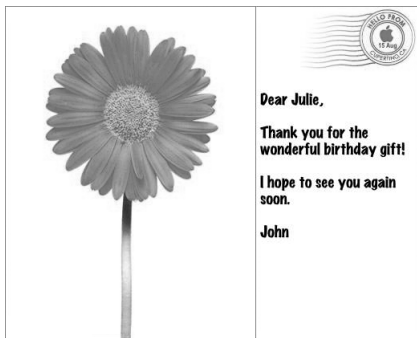

Keeping in Touch With iCards

iCards are electronic postcards delivered directly to the recipient's email box; there's no need to click a link or go to a special website to see an iCard.

You can choose from a variety of existing iCards or create one using an image from your iDisk.



Sending an iCard

You can send an iCard to anyone who has an email address.

To send an iCard:

- 1 Go to www.mac.com and click iCards.
- 2 Choose an image for your iCard from the image categories.
- 3 Type your message, choose a font, and click Continue.
- 4 Address your card, and then click Send Your Card.

Using Your Own Picture in an iCard

You can create a custom iCard using one of your own images.

To create a custom iCard:

- 1 Save your image in either JPEG or GIF format. Be sure to end the filename with a “.jpg” or “.gif” extension to match the format of the file (JPEG or GIF).
Note: Use only uppercase letters (A-Z), lowercase letters (a-z), numbers (0-9), or the underscore (_) in the part of the filename before the extension. For more information, see “Naming your images” in the iCards section of .Mac Help.
- 2 Choose Go > iDisk > My iDisk. (If you’re using a version of Mac OS X earlier than 10.3, choose Go > iDisk.)
- 3 Drag your image file into the Pictures folder on your iDisk, or a folder within your Pictures folder.
- 4 Go to www.mac.com and click iCards.
- 5 Click Create Your Own on the iCards Main Categories page.
- 6 Select the file in the Pictures Folder Images list, and then click Preview.
If you don’t see your picture in the list, make sure you’ve named it properly and put it in the Pictures folder on your iDisk. After placing your image in the Pictures folder, click Update Folder.
- 7 Click Select This Image.
If a message says, “Please select a valid picture,” try again, making sure you click Preview before you click Select This Image.

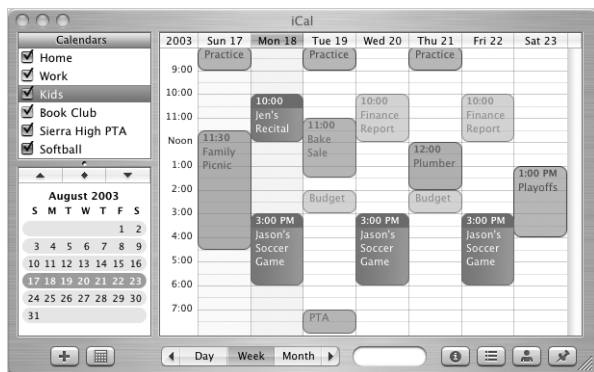

Sharing iCal Calendars Over the Web

With iCal and .Mac, you have the power to create and manage multiple calendars, share them online, and send calendar updates to friends and family.



Publishing a Calendar on the Web

Once you've used iCal to create your calendars, you can share them with family and friends so they can see what you're up to or have a reminder of special dates and events.

To publish a calendar on the web:

- 1 Click the name of the calendar you want to publish to select it.
- 2 Choose Calendar > Publish.
- 3 To change the name visitors see when the calendar is published, type a new name in the "Publish name" field. (This does not change the name in your Calendars list.)
- 4 If you want changes you make to your calendar to be automatically copied to the published version, select "Publish changes automatically." To turn off automatic updating, deselect the checkbox.
- 5 To control what information is published, select or deselect the other checkboxes.
- 6 Select "Publish on .Mac."
- 7 Click Publish.

When you publish your calendar on .Mac, you can send an email with the calendar's URL to family and colleagues, and they can view it using any web browser. They can also use iCal to subscribe to your published calendar. When you make changes, your subscribers will get automatic updates when they connect to the Internet.

iCal lets you manage and view more than one calendar at a time; send event invitations to people listed in your Mac OS X Address Book; and get notification of upcoming events with an onscreen message, via email, or via text messaging to a mobile phone or pager.

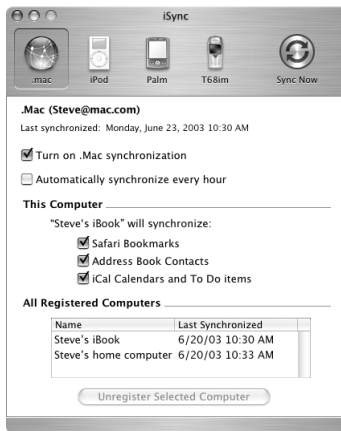

Accessing and Syncing Your Files

This chapter shows how you can use .Mac to keep your important information up-to-date and access your files from anywhere.

Keeping Your Information Up-to-Date With iSync

iSync lets you synchronize Address Book contacts, Safari bookmarks, and iCal information on multiple Mac OS computers using the Internet. You can also use iSync to synchronize the contact information in Address Book on your computer's hard disk with your .Mac Address Book on the web, and synchronize your Safari bookmarks on your computer with your .Mac Bookmarks on the web.



Syncing Your Safari Bookmarks, Address Book Contacts, and iCal Calendars

It's easy to synchronize your Safari bookmarks, Address Book contacts, and iCal calendars to the web.

To synchronize your information:

- 1 Open iSync and click the .Mac icon.
- 2 If you haven't used iSync before, click the Register button, enter a name to identify your computer, and click Continue.
- 3 Select the "Turn on .Mac synchronization" checkbox.
- 4 Select the Safari Bookmarks, Address Book Contacts, and "iCal Calendars and To Do Items" checkboxes.
- 5 Click the Sync Now button.
- 6 Once the sync has completed, go to www.mac.com, click Address Book, click Preferences, and then select the "Turn on .Mac Address Book Synchronization" checkbox.

With Address Book synchronization turned on, the contact information in your .Mac Address Book on the web and the Address Book application on your computer's hard disk will be synchronized each time you open iSync and click the Sync Now button.

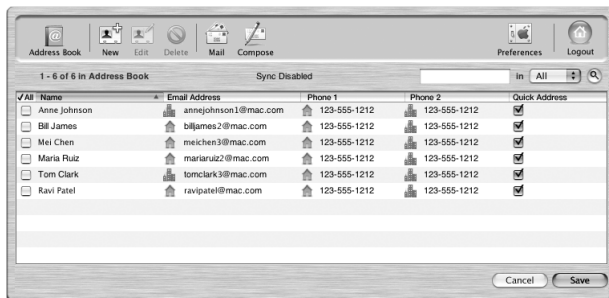
Learning More About iSync

In addition to synchronizing information between your computer's hard disk and .Mac, you can synchronize information between all of your Macintosh computers. iSync accesses data from your Mac OS X Address Book, iCal, and Safari and synchronizes it across all your Macs, so you always have the most up-to-date version of your data.

Storing Contact Information With Address Book

Use .Mac Address Book to store and retrieve email addresses and other contact information. The contact information in .Mac Address Book is stored on the web, so you can look up email addresses whenever you use .Mac Mail.



Adding a New Contact to Address Book

It's easy to store contact information for people you correspond with.

Note: If you already have contact information stored in the Address Book application on your computer's hard disk, you can copy it to your .Mac Address Book on the web using iSync. For more information, see "Keeping Your Information Up-to-Date With iSync" on page 25.

To add a new contact:

- 1 Go to www.mac.com and click Address Book.
- 2 Click New.
- 3 Type the contact information for the person you're adding.
- 4 Click Save.

Sending a Message Directly From Address Book

You can use .Mac Address Book to send an email message to any of your contacts.

To send a message from Address Book:

- 1 Go to www.mac.com and click Address Book.
- 2 Select the checkboxes to the left of the contacts you want to receive your message.
- 3 Click Compose.
- 4 Enter a subject line and the text of the message.
- 5 Click Send.

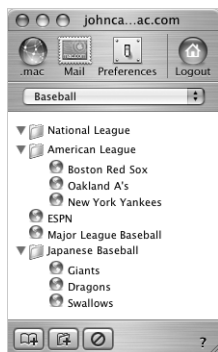
You can select how contacts are displayed and sorted, specify default email addresses and phone numbers, and set viewing preferences for Address Book. You can also synchronize the contact information between the Mac OS X Address Book application on your computer's hard disk and your .Mac Address Book on the web.

Using Bookmarks

Use .Mac Bookmarks to get to your favorite websites from any computer connected to the Internet. The surfer window gives you a complete view of all your bookmarks.



Bookmarking Webpages

It's easy to bookmark your favorite webpages so you can quickly access them in the future.

Note: If you already have bookmark information stored in the Safari application on your computer's hard disk, you can copy it to .Mac Bookmarks on the web using iSync. For more information, see "Keeping Your Information Up-to-Date With iSync" on page 25.

To bookmark a webpage:

- 1 Go to www.mac.com and click Bookmarks.
- 2 Click the Add Bookmark button (an open book with a plus sign).
- 3 Type a name for the bookmark in the Bookmark Name field.
- 4 Type the URL of the webpage in the Bookmark URL field.
- 5 Choose where you want to save it from the Add Bookmark To pop-up menu.
- 6 Click Add.

To visit a bookmarked website:

- Click its name in the surfer window.

It's easy to create new bookmark folders, rearrange items in the surfer window, and synchronize your .Mac Bookmarks on the web with the Safari bookmarks on your computer.

Safeguarding Your Files With Backup

It's a good idea to routinely back up files in case they become corrupted or unintentionally erased from your computer's hard disk. Backup lets you copy important files from your computer's hard disk to your iDisk, to a CD or DVD, or to a FireWire hard disk.



Note: Although you can protect your files by backing them up on your iDisk, burning them onto a CD or DVD, or copying them to a FireWire hard disk, Backup is most effective when used in a combination of ways. For example, it's a good idea to keep critical configuration data and documents on your iDisk and then store large files on CD, DVD, or on a FireWire hard disk. For more information on smart backup strategies, go to www.mac.com and click Backup.

Scheduling Regular Backups to Your iDisk

Backup remembers to back up your files, even if you don't. You can set a schedule to automatically back up your most important files to iDisk so you will always have the most recent version of your files stored away safely.

To schedule regular backups to your iDisk:

- 1 Choose "Back up to iDisk" from the pop-up menu.
- 2 Click Schedule Back-ups.
- 3 Select the backup frequency (Daily or Weekly).
- 4 Choose the time of day you would like the backup to occur. Scheduled backups occur within two hours of the time you specify.
- 5 If you're scheduling a weekly backup, choose the day of the week you want the backup to occur.

At the time your backup is scheduled to occur, make sure your computer is on and is not set to go to sleep, you are logged in, and the Backup application isn't open.

Restoring Backed-Up Files to Your Hard Disk

You can use Backup's one-click Restore feature to save files back to your hard disk.

To restore backed-up files to your hard disk:

- 1 Choose "Restore from iDisk" from the pop-up menu.
- 2 Select items you want to restore by clicking in the Restore column next to the items. Items with a checkmark will be restored.
- 3 Click Restore Now.

If newer versions of the files you are restoring exist on your hard disk, Backup asks if you want to replace them with the backed-up copies. You can click "Yes to All" if you don't want to approve each file individually.

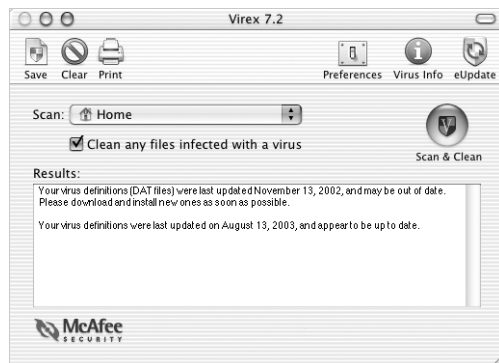

With the convenient QuickPicks feature, you can easily select groups of files to back up all at once, such as music you've purchased from the iTunes Music Store, your iPhoto pictures, or all the files on your desktop.

Protecting Your Mac With Virex

Virex antivirus software helps keep your computer safe from viruses and dangerous programs you may encounter while using the Internet. Virex automatically checks for the most recent virus updates so your Mac is always ready to handle the latest threats.



Scanning For and Cleaning Viruses

To scan for and clean viruses:

- 1 Open Virex.
- 2 Select the location on your computer that you want to scan and clean.
- 3 Select the “Clean any files infected with a virus” checkbox.
- 4 Click the Scan & Clean button.

A status bar appears while Virex examines and cleans the selected location. The results of the scan appear in the Results area.

In addition to scanning for and cleaning viruses, you can save and print scan results; view information on the latest viruses; and customize your scanning, cleaning, and virus update preferences.

Other .Mac Uses

.Mac works with Mac OS X and other applications to enhance the power of your Mac.

Using .Mac With Mac OS X

Because .Mac is seamlessly integrated with Mac OS X version 10.3, it's extremely easy to use.



Using Mac OS X to Check Available iDisk Storage

You can view available iDisk storage and set your iDisk Public folder's access privileges directly from Mac OS X.

To check available iDisk storage:

- 1 Open System Preferences.
- 2 Click .Mac.
- 3 Click iDisk.

The storage capacity of your iDisk depends on how much additional storage you have purchased. If you need more space, click Buy More.

Using a .Mac Slideshow as a Screen Saver

You can use another .Mac member's public slideshow as your screen saver. To set up a .Mac screen saver, you need the .Mac member name of the person publishing the pictures.

To set up a .Mac screen saver:

- 1 Open a web browser and visit a website to make sure you're connected to the Internet.
- 2 Open System Preferences and click Desktop & Screen Saver.
- 3 Click Screen Saver, and then select .Mac in the Screen Savers list.
- 4 Click Options.
- 5 Enter the .Mac member name in the .Mac Membership Name field.
- 6 Click OK.

The slideshow is downloaded to your computer. To view it, click Options, select the slideshow's checkbox in the Subscriptions list, and click OK.

As a .Mac member, you can use iPhoto to publish a slideshow to your iDisk, and anyone using Mac OS X version 10.2 or later can view it over the Internet. For more information, see "Sharing a Slideshow Over the Internet" on page 37.

Learning More About Using .Mac With Mac OS X

You can use Mac OS X version 10.3 to save files directly to your iDisk, open someone else's iDisk Public folder, and manage iDisk synchronization. For more information about using .Mac with Mac OS X version 10.3, choose Help > Mac Help in the Finder.

Using .Mac With iPhoto

iPhoto is the essential tool for organizing, saving, and sharing your digital photographs. With iPhoto and .Mac, it's easy to share a slideshow over the Internet or publish a photo album using HomePage.



Sharing a Slideshow Over the Internet

After you've imported your digital photographs into iPhoto, you can publish a slideshow to your iDisk, and anyone using Mac OS X version 10.2 or later can view it over the Internet.

To share a slideshow over the Internet:

- 1 Open iPhoto.
- 2 Select the photos you want in your slideshow. (You must select photos individually. To select an entire album, select the album in the library list, then choose **Edit > Select All**.)
- 3 Click the **Organize** button.
- 4 Click the **.Mac Slides** icon in the **Organize** pane.
- 5 Click **Publish**.

- 6 After your photos have been copied to your iDisk, click the Announce Slideshow button to tell other users how to view your slideshow.
