The Dorothy G. Page Museum has been busy this winter.

The Wasilla Community
Holiday Celebration was a
success including our fourth
annual Gingerbread House
competition and our first
annual 12x12 Days of
Christmas art exhibit.

In January, the Museum welcomed the 50th Statehood Quilt Exhibit. We were the first venue to showcase the 8-foot panels which filled our front gallery. Visitors were invited to walk through the colorful quilt blocks and see quilters' views of Alaska and its history through fabric.

In February we kicked off Iditarod Days with our third annual Iditarod Art Exhibit. This year the exhibit hosted two Jon Van Zyle originals and more than 15 original pieces by local artists. We look forward to hosting this exhibit again next year.

Also in February the Wasilla Public Library and the Museum received a Rasmuson grant to create educational traveling trunks for local home schools schools, and organizations. educational The Wasilla Knik Historical Society has generously offered to purchase the "trunks" that will house all the videos and educational materials for students and teachers. Beginning in August the trunks will be available for check out. This coincides with our fall exhibit New A Celebration Harmonies: American Roots Music opening Aug. 24. New Harmonies, produced by the Smithsonian and Museums on Main Street, follows the evolution of American music from spiritual and gospel to blues, jazz, country and rock 'n' roll. The Alaska Humanities Forum is paying for shipping costs of the exhibit. The Museum is one of four institutions in the state to host New Harmonies and is the only venue north of Homer to showcase the interactive educational exhibit. Mark your calendars now!

This summer is shaping up to be an exciting time as well. April 3, we opened Alaska Positive 2008. This photographic juried exhibit the winners highlights of the statewide competition from the Alaska State Museum. This is the third year the museum has hosted the exhibit and the photographs are on display through June 27.

In July we open Instruments as Art. This exhibit features instruments of various types and styles made by local artisans. This exhibit leads up to our blockbuster event in August, New Harmonies: A Celebration of American Roots Music.

Our education tours are piling up and we need volunteers. If you are interested in becoming an educational docent, please contact the museum at 373-9071.

A NEW BUSINESS AND A NEW LOOK

If you're looking for a good meal at yesterday's prices, try the <u>Krazy Moose Subs restaurant in Wasilla.</u>

Bob and Tamara Suders had a good thing going-many steady customers at their location near Fred Meyers in Wasilla, but the property was to be renovated and no longer available.

The Wasilla-Knik Historical Society was looking for a new tenant, the Suders were looking for a kitchen and dining area, centrally located, papers were signed and the Herning-Teeland-Mead building became home to one of the Valley's busiest establishments.

It was supposed to be a 'soft opening' when the restaurant opened Jan. 7. "I thought we'd be slow," said Tammy, but business was brisk; customers came in a steady stream.

The Suders are originally from Pennsylvania, where Bob worked on a dairy farm and Tammy in restaurants. Then they headed west in 1995, settling in Big Piney, Wyoming, population 1,000 and "100 miles from anything," Bob said. They opened a sitdown cafe, featuring subs. "Because we couldn¹t get a good one anywhere," he added.

It was a family-owned and operated business, with son Ethan and daughter Kendal working, too. Then the lure of Alaska beckoned. "It was everybody's dream," Bob said, "a place where people do something different." They arrived in Wasilla in 2005, and Krazy Moose Subs opened soon after. Their new location, on the corner of Boundary and Herning streets, is open from 10:30 a.m. to 8 p.m., and there are five employees, including Kendal. The dining room seats 60 at custom-built wood tables featuring an Alaskan motif. Tammy bakes bread daily, and Bob's chores include getting everything ready for the grill. Kendal bakes the cookies and works out front.

There are many take-out customers, and the most sandwiches served at one time? 200.

The Krazy Moose also has a lively catering business, but sit-down customers are the majority of the clientele.

Although pastimes include four-wheeling, fishing and moose hunting, there is less time for that now. "We have much more space here than our other location," Bob said, "probably double the space, including a much bigger kitchen. And - we have many more customers."

The menu includes hot and cold sandwiches, soup, salads, dessert and beverages. And the most popular items are chicken bacon and Italian subs.

"The soups a good seller, too," Bob added. His sister e-mailed from Pennsylvania, "I read about your new business on the Internet. About the good food. You are famous!"
